NEWC was notified by his daughter that Louis E. Dennis Jr. 82, one of the most generous, talented and revered wood carvers, passed away on July 2. She also said that Louis did not want a memorial service but those who met Louis will memorialize him in our own way. As Kim Rhault said, "he will always have a special place with us."

According to his website, Louis Dennis Jr. did not start carving until after his own master carver father passed away. Prior to picking up the family tradition, Louis worked building houses and making furniture. Once he had a knife in his hand, he found a new way to bring the best out of a piece of wood. Starting by carving a small spoon, he graduated to carving birds, ever larger and more grand. (photos below)

Louis is known for his generosity, giving many of his beautiful bird carvings to the Tree of Hope. That spirit of giving was recently seen alive and well when two very large donations were given to the Tree of Hope in Louis' memory. Chatham Fine Arts and Crafts Festival is being held in the Chatham Community Center in Chatham, Massachusetts September 9-10. They welcome woodcarvers to reserve spaces to sell their artwork. There is a cost to set up. Check them out online for more information.

Following presentation of the award, the auction began. Gary Filiault served as auctioneer, doing an amazing job and keeping the audience in stitches throughout. Books, tools, wood of all kind! Whatever the family of Paul Ward had donated to NEWC flew off the tables and into the hands of eager buyers. A total of \$318 dollars was realized by the end of the auction. To finish off the afternoon, members were asked for their input regarding the dissolution of the New England Woodcarvers. Reasons to consider dissolution included the lack of volunteers to fill empty Board positions, reluctance to volunteer to help at the SOW, and a drop in membership. Despite these very good reasons, the majority of members were in favor of continuing the effort to save the organization. Several salient suggestions were put forward toward that end: finding a permanent home; revising our mission statement; advertising for new members; encouraging volunteers by finding small tasks for them to do; assisting local clubs to expand their membership; changing our perception of NEWC as more than a club but also an association that provides services that bring local clubs together.

A questionnaire was sent to all members to solicit their feedback about NEWC. If you haven't completed yours yet, please do so as we will be compiling results to report here.

HOTELS FOR SOW 2023

Many regular competitors for SOW are calling concerned about the cost of hotel rooms near Peabody, MA. One person mentioned that rooms were going for up to \$1200 per night! And finding a room is very difficult. Why? Because Peabody is not far from Salem, MA, the witch capital of New England in October. Recommendations:

 Check Hotels.com, Expedia.com Vrbo and any of the other booking sites for prices and availability.

2. Look outside the immediate Peabody area. One hotel recommended that people search communities along Route 95 a 30 to 45 minutes north and west of Peabody. Woburn and Danvers are good places to look for hotels.

If you are close enough, 60 to 90 minutes from Peabody, drive from home. The NEWC President may be doing that.

4. If you live within 30 minutes of Peabody, can you host a carver for one night, someone you know from previous SOWs?
